

From the end of April this year we will be moving our online payment system for meals, trips, breakfast and afterschool provision etc. over to the Arbor App.

Parent Pay will not be accessible to you after 30th April.



Please could we ask you to bring all outstanding balances for meals, childcare provision, Little Seeds and Nursery fees up-to-date on Parent Pay before this change over.

<u>Check if your child is eligible for free school meals</u> and additional funding support

All children in reception, year 1 and year 2 at state schools in England automatically get free school meals.

However, parents and guardians are encouraged to apply for free school meals when they enrol their child in school, as this can help their child's school to attract additional '<u>pupil premium</u>' funding to support learning.

From year 3 onwards, children whose parents are getting any of the following are entitled to free school meals:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).
- Income Support (IS).
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA).
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA).
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit.
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income that does not exceed £16,190).
- Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment you get for a further 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).

How to apply

Apply through the **Devon Citizens Portal**. This is the quickest and easiest way to apply and will result in you getting an instant decision. Alternatively, call the Education Helpline on 0345 155 1019.

E-Scooters / Bicycles / Scooters

With the onset of the better weather we are conscious that parents/children will be wishing to cycle/scooter to school.

Please could you make sure you are aware of the guidance for these modes of transport.

Privately owned e-scooter

It's not currently possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters. This means it's illegal to use them on the road, pavement, cycle lanes and pedestrian areas. Use is only permitted on privately owned land with the landowner's permission.

Privately owned e-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), meaning they are subject to the same laws as motor vehicles. However, since they cannot meet UK road requirements (such as insurance, tax, and registration), they are banned from public roads and spaces and could result in the vehicle being seized under S.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 for having no insurance.

We would ask our parents/carers not to use this mode of transport to bring children to school.

Bicycles

Cycling is a popular means of transport both for commuting and exercise. <u>The</u> <u>Highway code</u> provides rules that legally 'must' be followed and advice that 'should' be followed to keep cyclists safe on the roads—please make yourselves aware of these by clicking on the link.

A breach of these rules is a criminal offence and can be used as evidence in both criminal and civil proceedings.

Rules for lights and brakes are examples of two areas that have legal requirements.

Throughout the year we organise for coaches from Devon Bikeability to visit us and provide children with Bikeability and Road Safety sessions.

Manual Scooters

If your child wishes to use their manual scooter to travel to and from school please encourage them to stay on pavements and not to scooter through the car park.

Children should wear helmets at all time whilst on a bicycle and it is recommended when riding a scooter. It would also be a good idea for them to wear high visibility clothing.


