Tapestry Online Learning expectations for children in Reception

Hello, after a few conversations with some of you this week we wanted to clarify Orchard Vales's expectations for home learning.

Each week a variety of activities will be uploaded by Miss Cawthonge, Miss Soundy, and Mrs XOUIL If we feel the activity is suitable for your child, then they will be tagged in it and you will be able to see the activity.

We do not expect you to complete every activity. We have chosen to give you a variety as we understand every child learns differently and want you to be able to fit these activities in with your day as easily as possible.

Each week our expectation is for each child to complete:

- the writing activity one of the topic/ creative activities
- · continue with their reading and tricky word charts.

If your child has a favourite activity, then please feel free to repeat it. Obviously if you want to do more then that is great but please do not feel pressured to do so.

We appreciate every day is different which is why we have spread our expectations across the week so you can fit in activities when they are most convenient for you and your family.

If you can upload observations of your child doing the activities please do, if not then please comment to let us know how you are getting on

Seesaw Seesaw Expectations

Photo/video uploads

- · Where possible, photo and video uploads should show the work only. If you are showing examples of yourself completing tasks, you must be appropriately clothed and must not feature any other children in your upload,
- All photo and video uploads which you are featured in must be approved by an adult at home before submitting to teachers for approval,
- Photo and video uploads should be used as a tool to evidence learning.

Comments and notes

- Comments and notes should be positive, polite and of an appropriate formality.
- Comments and notes should use correct grammatical structures (e.g. capital letters, full stops/question marks and complete sentences), just as we would expect you to use when writing in your books at school.
- Use the comments function to ask necessary questions or to make specific comments - think about how you can add to the learning conversation.
- In a group or 'everyone' post, please remember your comment is shared with everyone tagged - students and their parents.

- Staff will check the app up until 3:30pm each day. Whilst we appreciate that parents and children may use the apps at any other time, they should be aware that staff will not respond past this time.
- Please bear in mind that there are times in the day where online 'traffic' is very heavy on Seesaw, and so not all posts may be responded to.
- If parents have any queries that they wish to discuss further with their child's teacher, this can be done via the main school email - orchardvale@ventrus.org.uk

As part of active social media engagement, it is considered good practice for parents and carers to pro-actively monitor the use of the apps.


Foundation Stage and Key Stage One



Mrs Standen is one of our school Administrators, who has a degree in Zoology and is especially interested in entomology (the study of insects). She thought you might like to see what you could find in your gardens.

Since we cannot go far at the moment, I thought I'd try a mini safari in my garden. These are a few of the Insects I found in one afternoon. Perhaps you could have a look and see what you can find, there are many more little animals out there, all you have to do is look.



Zebra Spider

Technically spiders are not insects, all insects have six legs but spiders have eight. These little Zebra Spiders are very cute and jump if you disturb them. They are only small, less than 1cm so you will have to look closely to see them.



Fly

There are hundreds of species of flies. I thought this one was handsome with it's large red eyes. Their eyes are very different from ours, they are called compound eyes and have hundreds of lenses in each eye, instead of just the one like us.



Bees

Bees do a very important job for us. They are vital for pollinating a lot of plants which we use as our food. As you can see in the photo bees are very hairy and pollen gets stuck to this hair as they move from one flower to another collecting nectar to make honey.



Hoverflies

These are flies but have markings like a bee or wasp to protect them from predators. You can tell these are flies because they only have two wings, not four like bees and wasps.



Solitary bee

This little bee is known as a solitary bee because it does not build a big nest and live in a colony like some other bees.

Perhaps you can have a look around your gardens to see what you can find. There are quite a lot of butterflies around at the moment and they are larger and easier to see.

This is a story about a dragon by Matilda in year 2. Mrs Huggins loves how she describes her dragon as "she slithers like a snake"!




Elise

Recreate famous landmarks using what they had available at home.































Amigos is a charity set up and run from North Devon to support communities in Uganda with:


- Rural community development (transforming communities, conservation farming, water, business skills, bicycles, beekeeping),
